Roxbourne Park

Located between Rayners Lane and Eastcote, the Park was created in 1936 on an old landfill site and adjoins Roxbourne Rough Nature Reserve, managed by Harrow Nature Conservation Forum.

A miniature railway is located at the Field End Road side of the Park, where children can enjoy train rides during the summer on Sunday afternoons. Other facilities include senior and junior football pitches, a cricket square, changing facilities, a children's play area and a basketball practice goal.

The Park itself has been planted with a variety of fine ornamental trees, which compliment the more natural areas of the Park. The grass areas between the trees provides a feeding area for green woodpeckers. The Yeading Brook winds its way through the eastern side of the Park.

Roxbourne Rough

A series of species-rich grassy meadows, the reserve is managed by Harrow Nature Conservation Forum.

The tallest trees on the reserve are poplars, you will see the leaves quivering in even the lightest breeze.

The blackthorn hedge at the western side of the reserve bears its lacy white blossom on bare leafless branches in April. In late summer you will see their small bitter fruits called sloes that can be used to flavour gin.

A number of species of willow are common on the reserve, several of which can be seen around the pond.

What to look for at Roxbourne Park and Roxbourne Rough:

- Crack willow
- Damselfly
- Blackthorn
- Garlic mustard
- Red campion
- Hogweed
- Long-tailed tit
- Kestrel
- Green woodpecker
- Kingfisher
